Camp Joy

There are quite a few landmarks around Star Lake. When you meet someone that is on Star and you're talking about where they are on the lake, or you're getting the latest fish story, the response is usually in relationship to one of the following: the duCharme's corner, the bridge, the Boy's Camp, the old Rocky's, the public access, and of course – Camp Joy.

Camp Joy is one of those spots on the lake that we all admire and enjoy a slow boat or pontoon ride past the camp. Their swimming beach is beautiful, the water is usually calm in the summer, the white cabins are nestled in along the shoreline, the peaceful chapel with amazing views of sunsets, and the sound of kids having fun with lots of laughter in the air.

Camp Joy celebrated its 80th Anniversary on Star Lake in 2021. The Camp had originally started in 1939 on Lake Lida, then moved to a small strip of land along the south shore of Star Lake. The land was so small that each end of the main building (now the Dining Hall) touched the border of the property. Over the years, Camp Joy has expanded to include the Chapel (built in 1955), cabins, a craft hall, a Staff House and Guest Lodge, and 16 wide open acres that includes a basketball court, playground and ball field.

Matt Larson is the Camp Director, and 2023 will be his 6th summer as the Director at Camp Joy. Matt and his wife Krista have been married for 22 years and have four children ages 19, 18, 15 and 13. The entire family works at the camp each year – Krista is the Assistant Director and the kids also work at the camp. When he's not at the Camp, Matt is a Bible, Math and History teacher at Park Christian School in Moorhead, MN, and they live in Fargo, ND.

Fisheries Improvement

Writing the Fall newsletter is always bittersweet. As Summer comes turns into Fall, lots of changes happen. Docks get pulled out, kids go to school, weather cools and then turns cold, and before you know it the snow is flying and winter is here.



It was good to see the lake levels rebound this year after last year's low levels. Hopefully we can see some consistency in the years to come. It was good to see lots of boats on the lake this summer. There were always mixed reviews as far as how fishing is - I guess that is why they call it fishing and not catching!

There are a few things that have our attention lately on the fisheries side. There is interest in changing bluegill limits. I have been in contact with MN Fisheries on the steps to accomplish this. The state knows the Association has interest in reviewing limits and a possible change. Initial discussions on this gives us a couple options, including lowering the limit or possibly limiting the size of fish being kept, and possibly a mixture of both. MN DNR has a lot of history with limit changes and effects on other lakes that have enacted changes.

Another item is the parking congestion and where the ice fishermen are accessing the lake on Beaver Dam Road. Anyone that is around after the ice forms knows how busy that area can get. There are no parking signs that are not being adhered to. Also the lake shore takes a beating from vehicles passing onto the ice to fish. We have asked both Star Lake and Dead Lake Township for their support with the no parking signs, and Otter Tail County Sherriff for enforcement. If you see violations, please report it to the appropriate authorities. The numbers are provided on the back page of this newsletter.

There has been a number of individuals interested in being part of the fisheries group that works on one or both of those items. Please watch your emails for upcoming news and discussion. If you would like to join in, please reach out to me.

Aquatic Invasive Species Monitoring

The Star Lake AIS Committee is celebrating one year of working together to learn and share about Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) in order to help all property owners preserve Star Lake's excellent water quality, bountiful fishery, natural wildlife haven, and its ordinary and proper development. Committee members include Bob Gettel, Bonnie Graham, Kristin Daniels, Lee Mindemann, and Linda Dimitrijevich (SLPOA Board Member and AIS Committee Liaison). You may have met some of the committee members



at the Star Lake AIS education tables at the Annual Meeting and the Star Lake Picnic this summer!

Over the last year, the committee's main goal was to become more familiar to AIS in and around Star Lake. This was primarily done through the AIS Detectors and AIS 101 courses from the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC), associated with the University of Minnesota. Committee members also took a bus trip to Lake Koronis on July 11th to witness the damage done by Starry Stonewort and participated in Starry Trek on August 20th, an annual statewide event focused on searching for one of Minnesota's newest aquatic invasive species, starry stonewort, an invasive algae that was first found in Lake Koronis in 2015.

Star Lake AIS Status

At this time, Star Lake still only has one identified AIS; Zebra Mussels. Unfortunately, there is no feasible treatment for Zebra Mussels except to prevent the spread to other lakes. In August, the two Star Lake Public Accesses were assessed for AIS with a sampling rake but neither Curly-leaf Pondweed nor Starry Stonewort were found. The AIS Committee will continue to monitor our lake for additional AIS.

Did You Know...

Some of you may have seen Wake Boats on Star Lake this past summer. "Wake boats are powerboats specially designed to increase wave height for watersports. The hull is shaped to achieve maximum wake and many have a hydrofoil device that lowers the stern when the boat is under power. Most wake boats also have built-in ballast tanks that can be filled with lake water to increase the weight in the stern of the boat and create larger waves." Recently, the AIS committee has learned that Wake Boats can be harmful to the environment by "increasing shoreline erosion, decreasing water clarity and plant abundance (Asplund and Cook 1997), and increasing phosphorus in the water column (Yousef et al. 1980)". Wake boats can also increase the chances of spreading AIS from one lake to another "due to the presence of large ballast tanks that can be filled from or emptied directly into the water body they are operating on". The AIS Committee encourages all boat owners to take action to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species, including draining all water from your wake boat ballast before transporting your boat over land. The DNR does not measure ice thickness on Minnesota lakes. Your safety is your responsibility, check ice thickness at least every 150 feet.

Test the thickness yourself using an ice chisel, ice auger or even a cordless 1/4 inch drill with a long bit.

Writing about Camp Joy and their message of true **JOY** has inspired us to add a new feature to our newsletter. There are many ways that we can serve others - whether it is sharing our time, talents, passions or financial resources. There are numerous groups and associations near Star Lake that you may not know about. Our plan is to share information about some of these organizations within our newsletter with the hope of offering you opportunities to serve others. The first organization in our **JOY** Spotlight is **Quilts of Valor®**. We hope you enjoy the read.

One of my hobbies that I have been able to spend more time with since retiring is sewing quilts. Recently, I needed to find someone with a longarm for a special quilt project I had been working on. Not quite knowing where to begin looking, my husband (Mike) mentioned that he had happened to see a room at the Dent Community Center that had some Longarm machines set up (pretty impressive that he even knew what a longarm is – let alone remember to tell me about them). And that is how I met Jenny Caughey and was introduced to Quilts of Valor®.

Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 with a dream, literally a dream. The founder, Catherine Roberts' son Nat was deployed in Iraq. According to Catherine,



"The dream was as vivid as real life. I saw a young man sitting on the side of his bed in the middle of the night, hunched over. The permeating feeling was one of utter despair. I could see his war demons clustered around, dragging him down into an emotional gutter. Then, as if viewing a movie, I saw him in the next scene wrapped in a quilt. His whole demeanor changed from one of despair to one of hope and well-being. The quilt had made this dramatic change. The message of my dream was: Quilts = Healing."

Quilts of Valor® was born. Their mission: To cover Service Members and Veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor®. Their focus is on those most in need of comfort and healing first; those who need to know their sacrifice is acknowledged, those who need the affirmation of a hug, and those who never heard the words "Welcome Home". Wow – that is powerful.

A Quilt of Valor® (QOV) is a quality, handmade quilt that is machine or hand quilted. It is awarded to a Service Member or Veteran who has been touched by war. The Quilt says unequivocally, "Thank you for your service and sacrifice in serving our nation." It must be a specific size, it must have a label with required information, it must be awarded, and it must be recorded.

Jenny became involved with Quilts of Valor® in 2005 when she and a friend organized the Perham chapter of QOV, starting with just 8 quilters. The chapter has flourished, growing to more than 40 members, added two additional groups (St. James and Fergus Falls) with memberships now totaling over 100 quilters. As the State Coordinator for QOV, Jenny's priorities are to expand the state's network of quilters; encourage and enable a younger generation of volunteers to make Quilts of Valor®, and bring more public awareness to the work of QOV volunteers and QOV Foundation. Jenny's dedication and commitment to the group, volunteers, foundation and mission is very evident – she lights up just talking about them and has volunteered countless hours to grow not only this chapter, but others within Minnesota and other states as well.

The group has been meeting in Dent at Community Center twice a month, with two of the former classrooms dedicated to Quilts of Valor®. The process is just like a well-oiled machine. Volunteers cut fabric to make quilt top kits (each kit includes all of the pieces needed for the quilt top, binding, and a label); the kits go out to sewers (who sign their names as the stitcher); the finished tops come back to be matched to a fabric backing; the top and backing is quilted by a longarm or machine (quilter adds their name to the label); the quilt is trimmed up and a binding is sewn on; and the binding is finished by hand-stitching it to the back of the quilt (with the finisher's name added to the label). This group is extremely productive – in addition to supplying quilts for presentation in this area, they support other chapters with finished quilts to be presented to recipients in Louisiana, Texas and many other states.

If you are interested, support for the local QOV group can be provided in several ways: Eat at The Perham Pizza Ranch on the 2nd Monday of the month (the next date is November 14th) and a portion of the dine-in receipts will be shared with QOV; volunteer your time at meetings; cut quilt pieces for kits; sew a quilt top; hand-stitch a binding; nominate a recipient; donate fabric and other supplies, or donate financially.

The local QOV group meets at the Dent Community Center on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of every month, starting in the morning through the afternoon. The time literally flies by, with a short break for a shared lunch. I've only volunteered 3 times, but have met so many wonderful women, have shared much laughter, listened to heartwarming stories of veterans' responses from being wrapped up in their quilts, and found another great purpose for my time in retirement.

A recent headline in the Minneapolis Tribune read "Minnesotans are 'driving like crazy' and its killing people" (September 6, 2022). Speed is the leading cause of increased fatalities in Minnesota this year. As if we had not noticed. Those of us on Star Lake have experienced this speeding for several years along Minnesota Highway 108 and have been working to try and find a solution.

As an Association, we requested a change in the speed limit on the highway along the north shore from 40 mph to 35 mph, as well as expanding the length of the speed zone. We were not successful. MnDOT officials nixed both ideas. Their own speed study, done in August of 2021, proved that 83% of the vehicles traveling along this section of MN Hwy 108 were speeding, some as fast as 73 mph. So we moved on to Plan B – reinforcing the posted speed limit with Dynamic Speed Signs.

After an 18-month effort and numerous obstacles, we have finally accomplished our goal. We have ordered two Dynamic Speed Signs for installation on the 40 mph speed zone and they are solar powered. We have acquired the necessary permit (with the help of the Star Lake Township Board), ordered the signs and MnDOT will install them when they arrive. This is not an inexpensive attempt to slow the traffic down but we feel strongly that it is going to help. Those who travel Highway 108 thru the Lida area have seen these signs in the 30 MPH zone on the lake's South side. Hopefully by next spring these signs will be flashing to advise drivers of the speed limit (40 MPH) and slowing traffic down to the posted limit along Highway 108 along Star Lake.

The Association is investing in your safety. Purchasing these signs would be impossible for an individual to fund and install but with the membership of the Association we can do this type of activity. To that end, watch for fund raising events and activities to help fund these signs, starting with your purchases at the Star Lake Online Store opening up October 30th.

So, look for the flashing signs, slow down, and know that you are part of the solution to the speeding issue. My Thanks to Star Lake Township, to the district traffic engineer for MnDOT, and to our membership for supporting this endeavor.



We Are Water Calendar - 2023

Every summer at Star Lake means water fun! This past July, Kristin Nielsen Daniels captured her niece and nephews jumping off of a towable tube.
